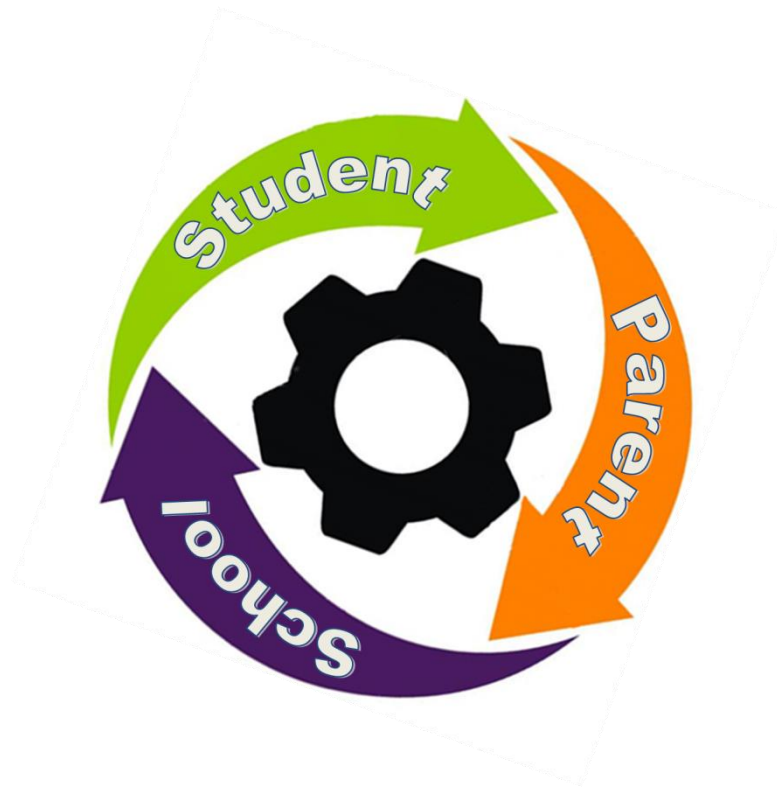

EXAMPLE OF HOW TO START YOUR REVISION A CHRISTMAS CAROL

THERE ARE FIVE STAVES OR CHAPTERS – bullet point everything that you can remember that happens in each stave – one stave at a time.

THERE ARE TEN MAIN CHARACTERS – Write down what you know about each of them – one character at a time.

CONTEXTUAL INFORMATION – Write down what you can remember about the world Dickens was living and writing in and why Dickens wrote this story.

THEMES – Write down any themes you can remember learning about.

See where your gaps are and then go online, find the missing info and write it into your notes. Once your notes are complete – write them onto a revision card or section in a notebook.

30 minutes max.

The same process works for Macbeth, their Modern Text, and each of the poems you have studied.

“HOW ARE WE SUPPOSED TO REMEMBER ALL THOSE QUOTES MISS?”

For novels and plays – all you really need is three or four multi purpose quotes for each character and each theme.

For the poetry – you need three or four key quotes for each of the poems from the anthology.

Be really thoughtful with your choice of quotes. If one of the things you have said in your character notes for Mr Birling is that he is arrogant and ignorant - what would be a good quote to support this?

Add your quotes to your notes and practise ‘exploding them’ – Who said them? To who? Why? What language features do they include? Why have those language features been used? What effect do they create?

‘unsinkable, absolutely unsinkable’

The fact he is speaking about the titanic is dramatic irony - it had sunk 30+ years before Priestley’s play was staged.

All this proves that he is an arrogant, ignorant man

The repetition and the adverb show how emphatic he is being

NEXT STEPS

After you know the texts really well and have made your revision notes, you can start practising writing essays, parts of essays, paragraphs of analysis, introductions to essays, ways to include contextual links.

Pupils who do well in exams usually have a clear idea about what they are going to write before they go into the exam – if you already know what you think about Lady Macbeth and how you can express and support your thoughts – it's much easier.

Once you have practised, you will be able to tweak what you have written to fit other similar exam questions.

Pick out language features and powerful words and practise ‘exploding’ them in the same way as you have for Literature.

Think about the overall structure of the text – how does it begin and end? Does it flashback or flashforward?

**Take work you've done in lesson or in exams
and improve it at home.**

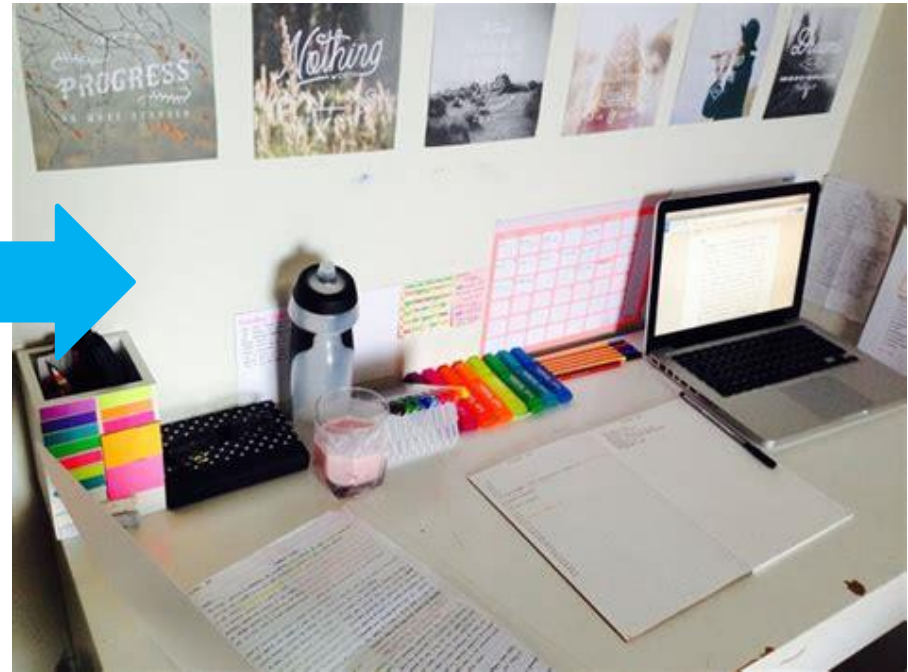

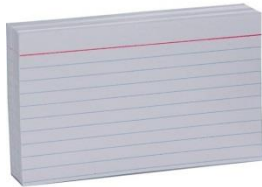

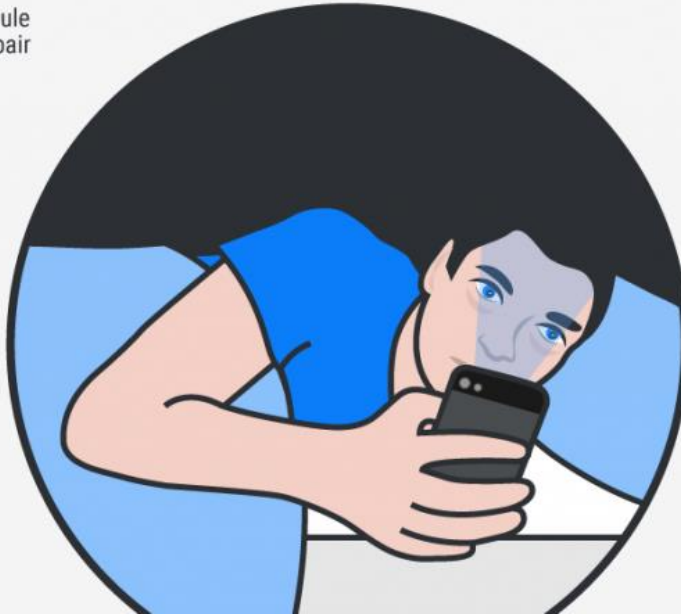
MONITOR THEIR SLEEP

The disruption to your sleep schedule might leave you distracted and impair your **MEMORY** the next day.

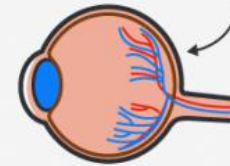


A poor night's sleep caused by smartphone light can make it **HARDER TO LEARN**.

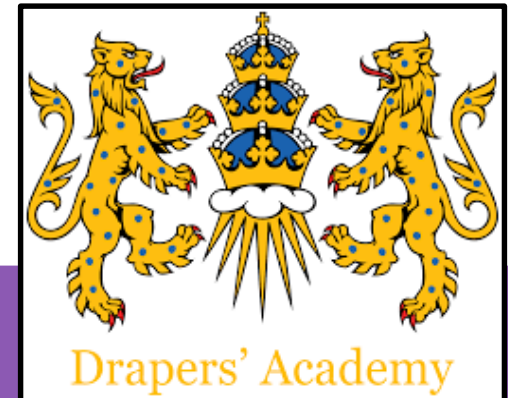

WHAT COURSES?

BTECs are designed for young people interested in a particular sector or industry but who are not yet sure what job they'd like to do.

You could study a BTEC at Level 2 or 3, either alongside academic qualifications or as part of a wider programme (such as an apprenticeship). You can also study a BTEC as a standalone course.

Advanced level qualifications (**A levels**) are subject-based qualifications that can lead to university, further study, training, or work. You can normally study three or more A levels over two years. They're usually assessed by a series of examinations.

You need:

- At least 5 GCSEs at grades 9 to 4/A* to C
- At least grade 6 in the subject specific subjects you want to study



T Levels are new two-year courses equivalent to three levels, which will be available to students in England from September 2020.

T Levels are designed by employers, and will offer around 1,800 hours of study over two years. This will include a 45-day work placement, so T Levels will be more suited to students who know what occupation or industry they want to move into.

What T Level subjects are available?

T levels have been introduced over 2 years. T levels are being offered locally by New City College, Barking and Dagenham College and South Essex College in subjects such as Engineering, construction, Health and Digital Production.

APPRENTICESHIPS


An apprenticeship is a paid job where the employee learns and gains valuable experiences.

Alongside on-the-job training, apprentices spend at least 20% of their working hours completing classroom-based learning with a college, university or training provider which leads to a nationally recognised qualification.


An apprenticeship includes:

- paid employment with holiday leave
- hands-on-experience in a sector/role of interest
- at least 20% off-the-job training
- formal assessment which leads to a nationally recognised qualification

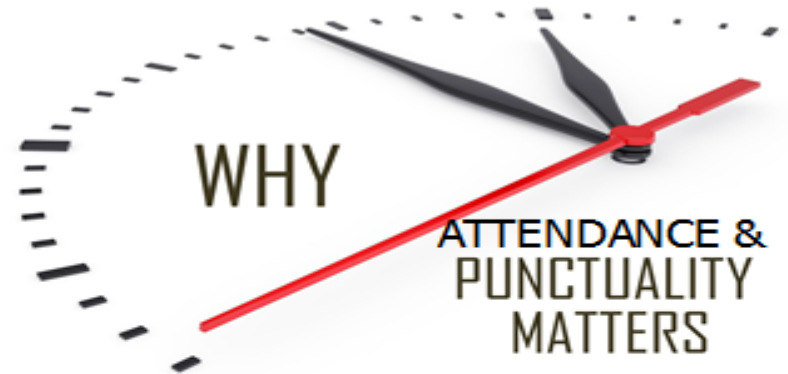
- Students with over 90% attendance at school are more likely to gain five or more 5 - 9 GCSEs or equivalent qualifications.

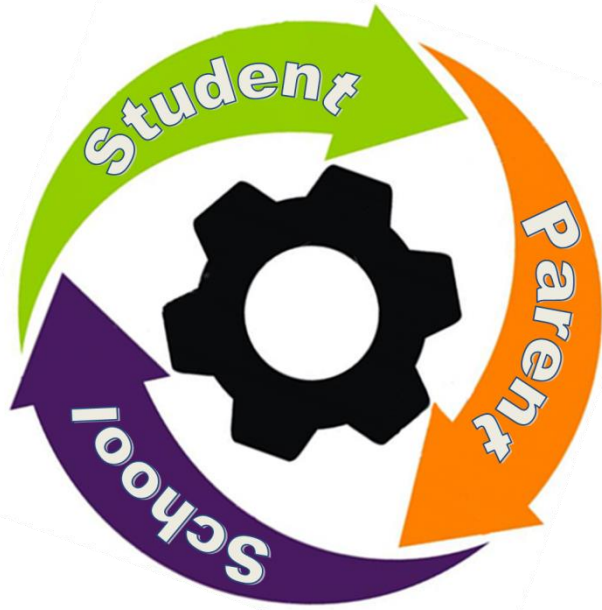
