

# RELATIONSHIPS & SEX EDUCATION POLICY

#### Introduction

Relationships and Sex Education (RSE) is part of a lifelong learning about physical, moral and emotional development. At EPA, RSE is centred on personal safety, caring for others and building strong family relationships. This is coupled with teaching students about sexual health (including safe sex), and sexuality. Effective relationships and sex education is essential if young people are to make responsible and well informed decisions about their lives.

RSE at EPA is intended to help pupils learn about relationships, emotions, sexuality and sexual health. We aim to present relevant facts in an objective and balanced manner. Lessons are set in the context of the family, friends and wider societal issues and address responsibilities that arise from within these relationships.

RSE at EPA will help young people learn to respect themselves and others and move with confidence from childhood through adolescence into adulthood.

Under the Academies Act 2010 all schools must provide a balanced and broadly-based curriculum which: - promotes the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of pupils at the school and of society, and - prepares pupils at the school for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of later life.

All maintained secondary schools must provide relationship and sex education (including education about sexually transmitted disease such as HIV and AIDS and child protection issues such as FGM and child sexual exploitation) and must teach human growth and reproduction as set out in the national curriculum. This is a statutory requirement.

#### Legislation

We are required to teach RSE as part of statutory guidance that states from September 2019, all schools must deliver relationships and sex education in secondary schools. The parental right to withdraw pupils from RSE remains in primary and secondary education, for aspects of sex education which are not part of the Science curriculum.

#### Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural

The delivery of RSE at EPA is underpinned by the following moral and statements:

- The delivery of RSE is factual, sensitive and balanced.
- RSE within the school promotes meaningful, loving, and healthy relationships.
- Whilst delivering RSE staff will avoid the imposition of personal opinion. Instead they will stay focused on the social, moral, spiritual, health and education aspects of the topics.

Across the faiths, there is obviously some variation in attitudes and outlooks in regard to Relationships and Sex. Whilst such views are not necessarily shared by all, they must be respected by all as there are "No Outsiders" within our community. EPA is respectful of all cultural and religious differences.

#### **Parental Rights and the Curriculum**

Parents do not have the right to withdraw their child from the RSE element of the National Science Curriculum. This is the biological aspects of human growth and reproduction. Information on sex and relationships, skills development and values clarification are taught within PSHE.

Parents do have the right to withdraw their child from RSE provided it is within PSHE. If a parent wishes to withdraw their child from aspects of the RSE programme then they need to write a letter to the Head Teacher stating their reasons for the request. Parents will be invited into school to discuss their relevant concerns regarding the programme with the relevant teaching staff in the school and to view materials.

The new legislation brought in through the Children and Social Work Act 2017 brought important changes in relation to parental rights to withdraw children from school RSE:

- 1. Parents will not be able to withdraw their child from relationships education in primary school or secondary school.
- 2. At secondary school level parents will be able to withdraw their child from sex education (other than the sex education which sits in the National Curriculum as part of science in maintained schools). However, a child will also have a right to opt into sex education from their 15th birthday (specifically three academic terms before they turn 16).

#### The Teaching of Relationships, Sex Education

RSE is taught across the curriculum but specifically in PSHE (delivered in the Summer Term of the Cultural Studies programme) and Science.

Form activities and assemblies form a vital part of the PSHE curriculum and many aspects of healthy relationships will be delivered at these times. Form activities are Zoomed into Form Time for consistency across the school.

Drop down sessions will also take place with each year group throughout the year.

In the Year 10 session they will have 4 presentations on: Consent, STIs, Contraception, Checking your body and high-risk behaviour.

Each year group also have the opportunity to ask questions about relationships and sex anonymously through Form Time, these questions are then answered in age appropriate Zoom sessions, whereby students can also ask questions via the chat facility on Zoom.

#### **Safety and Confidentiality**

Staff are guided by the Fraser Guidelines\*, which provide guidance for health and education professionals and details of these are provided in the DfEE Sex and Relations Education (2000) guidance. We make it clear to pupils what our procedures are, with regard to confidentiality. Similarly, if questions are asked in class or in assembly adults will follow agreed practice based on DfEE guidance 2000. Teachers are aware that effective RSE, which brings an understanding of what is and what is not appropriate in a relationship, can lead to a disclosure of a child protection issue.

Teachers will consult with the designated safeguarding lead Ms Marsh and in her absence her deputy Mrs Egleton.

### How are resources used with reasons for their selection?

RSE resources are chosen and checked for:

- Being inclusive acknowledging the full spectrum of diversity in society
- Positive, healthy and unbiased messages
- Age and understanding appropriateness.

How will EPA deal with sexually explicit questions?

EPA will:

- Allow individual staff to use their professional judgement as to answering questions in front of the whole class or individually, taking into account the Safeguarding Policy.
- Encourage learners to ask their parents/carers any question outside the planned programme.
- Set out clear ground rules regarding personal questions, which are agreed by staff beforehand.
- Have designated adults that learners know of to go to if they wish to talk.

What kind of language will be considered acceptable and appropriate for use in RSE lessons?

Staff will:

- Use the correct terms for all body parts.
- Use clear, unequivocal language in an objective manner.
- Discuss what 'slang' words mean and say that some can be seen as offensive.

Staff will use their judgement in discussion depending on understanding and maturity level of learners.

What Ground Rules specific to RSE will be used at EPA?

- 1: Use appropriate and scientific names for body parts.
- 2: Do not refer to a personal situation or ask personal questions.
- 3: Do not attempt to embarrass anyone in the classroom.
- 4: If you have any concerns following the lesson talk to an adult you can trust as soon as possible.
- 5: Remember in school we can help you, but we cannot promise confidentiality.

#### **Monitoring & Evaluation of RSE**

The Social Science Faculty plan and monitor the delivery of the RSE spiral programme and ensure that all aspects of RSE are covered as defined in government guidance especially the National Curriculum for PSHE- "personal wellbeing".

The programme is reviewed on an annual basis. Lessons are observed by the Social Science Faculty and pupils are consulted on the delivery and effectiveness of the lessons.

As part of effective RSE provision, the RSE policy should be reviewed every September to ensure that it continues to meet the needs of pupils, staff and parents and that it is in line with current Department for Education advice and guidance.
